Millage for Public Safety

Safety is one of life's necessities. Sherwood has always valued public safety. When I was living in Germany, and we got the Little Rock Air Force Base assignment, I asked my friends stationed there where we should look for a home. I was told to live in either Sherwood or Cabot. They said Sherwood because it is so safe and close to many amenities. Since then, the cost of public safety has skyrocketed. Here are a few reasons why:

Jail expenses have gone up. An Arkansas Supreme Court ruling has allowed counties to bill municipalities a daily per-inmate rate. In the past, Sherwood paid a flat rate per year. However, this is no longer the case, and we are billed per inmate per day. The rate varies widely from place to place, with Pulaski County Detention Center being one of the most expensive. Currently, Pulaski County Detention Center charges the state \$40 per day, but it charges the cities in Pulaski County \$63.20. In comparison, Saline County charges their cities \$46.14.

In the past ten years, the annual total bill has increased from \$80,800 to \$394,000, a 389% increase. From 2021 to now, it has gone up 115%. With the way that the billing is done now, almost every inmate is billed for a minimum of two days, even if it is a matter of a few hours. This has placed a huge burden on the cities in Pulaski County. Some police forces are now doing a summons to appear in court instead of taking someone to jail. However, in our police department's opinion, this is not a strong deterrent to crime. Cities with high crime rates surround Sherwood, yet our city's crime rate remains one of the lowest in the state. This is because Sherwood has a reputation for being serious about crime. It is crucial that we maintain a strong police force and how Sherwood is policed.

The cost for equipment and salaries for our police has increased. Equipment like vehicles, radios, cameras, and body armor are just some examples of items that have become more expensive. For example, the radios that our police use are no longer being made nor are they manufacturing the parts. Therefore, the new radios that we will have to start replacing them with are \$9,000 each. Additionally, the city recently increased police pay because we had become the lowest in Pulaski County. We must remain competitive to be able to continue to recruit strong officer candidates. This pay increase comes at an increased cost of \$220,000 per year.

The state has mandated a consolidation of 911 centers. Consolidation makes a lot of sense, given that Arkansas is a primarily rural state. There are counties that do not even have half the population of Sherwood. However, this has created some unintended consequences, such as increased expenses for nonrural municipalities. Pulaski County used to have six separate call centers, but now we are only allowed three. Based on call volume, Little Rock was given one. The county and Jacksonville will consolidate into one call center, and Sherwood, North Little Rock, and Maumelle will become one call center. North Little Rock call center employees make more than Sherwood, and Sherwood employees make more than Maumelle, yet all three cities will now be doing the same job in the same location. Therefore, Sherwood and Maumelle must increase their salaries to match North Little Rock. This increase in pay will cost \$136,000 per year. New equipment will also be required so that everyone is using the same equipment.

Although all the systems must work together, there is currently no existing call center big enough in any of these cities to accommodate this, so there will be costs involved in creating this space. The state will provide some funding, but this will not cover all the needed equipment, let alone the improvements required to construct a facility.

Sherwood has grown. Sherwood has grown. We all know that Sherwood has grown significantly for the past decade and continues to grow. This means more people to provide services for and more infrastructure to maintain. Therefore, the growth that is good for our community is also putting a strain on maintaining the same level of services. Let alone expanding what the city can provide residents and businesses alike, making us less competitive.

What is the solution to these rising expenses in public safety? By state law, all cities can levy up to 5 mills by a vote of the City Council. Sherwood does not use this tool, unlike the other class one cities. It is not just the class one cities that use this tool; most municipalities do. Sherwood's practice of no millage has been very dangerous and is not fiscally responsible. The reason why is that a millage is a steady stream of revenue. As the city grows with new homes, so does the income from the millage. Sales tax varies from year to year, making the city vulnerable to economic downturns. Thus, the city should have to have more reserves as a fallback than

those with millage. This, however, was not Sherwood's practice. There have been some very lean years in the past, and we were lucky. This would be like a retired person who lives off their savings, placing all their savings in the stock market and not diversifying. This is just not a fiscally responsible practice.

So, what does a one mill increase look like? In 2024, the average home price in Sherwood is \$224,922, according to Zillow. I found a home that recently closed for \$226,000 and looked up the tax information with the Pulaski County Assessor's Office. In 2024, the total property tax due on this home is \$1,186.48. With the proposed millage the new property tax would be \$1,218.85. This translates to a manageable \$32.27 increase per year for this homeowner—just \$0.62 per week. The current millage is based on twenty percent of the assessed value multiplied by .0521. This would change to .0531.

The Council's dedication of this millage for public safety will have a significant impact. The expected amount that this will raise, approximately \$649,000, will go a long way to offsetting the expenses needed to keep our city safe. This increase will allow us to maintain the same level of services that our residents are accustomed to, providing a sense of security and well-being.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING



TABLED UNTIL SEPTEMBER - A resolution amending the Vision Sherwood 2040 Comprehensive Plan and Master Street Plan. The purpose of this resolution is to increase road connectivity as well as park land access for the future. It also updates the master street plan to reflect both current and proposed future development of the Oakdale area. This was tabled for next month and Staff plans on making some adjustments.

PASSED UNANIMOUSLY - An ordinance amending the official zoning districts map for the property located at 300 Trammel Road. This ordinance rezones this property from R-1 to C-4. This property is being used as an event venue. This property does not lie solely in the city limits but is also in the county as it is on the outer edge of Sherwood. This would put this existing business in compliance.

READ ONE TIME - An ordinance amending the official zoning districts map for the property located at Lot 19RR Meriwood Addition. This ordinance rezones the corner of Pennwood and Kiehl from C-2 to C-3. The individuals that are requesting this change have the property under contract and stated that they wanted to put a coffee Kiosk on the property. This would not be allowed with current zoning. This zoning is in keeping with the Vision 2040 plan. The residents on Pennwood have expressed concern about an increase in traffic on their street due to this zoning. Several Council Members spoke against this proposed zoning and business if there would be an ingress or egress onto Pennwood. It will go to the second reading next month.

PASSED UNANIMOUSLY - A resolution expressing the willingness of the City of Sherwood to utilize federal-aid transportation program funds. This resolution fulfills the grant requirement of showing that the City of Sherwood agrees with applying for this \$4 million transportation grant for the construction of Jacksonville/Cato part 2. If received, this grant would offset the deficit in the street bond project left by overages on some of the already completed projects.

WITHDRAWN - Third reading of an ordinance amending Ordinance 2140 regarding the adoption of new policies and procedures for animal control. This ordinance aims to update the policies to reflect current best practices in this field. One of the many updates is changing the breed-specific language to that of behavior. A dog would be labeled vicious based on behavior versus breed. There are strong opinions on both sides of this issue, and there has been a lot of public comment. This ordinance was read at the June and July City Council Meetings. Council Member Harmon noted that if it was voted on and failed, it could not be brought up for a year. He asked for it to be withdrawn so that he could work with Chris Clark, Animal Control Supervisor, on a compromised piece of legislation, acknowledging that having this ban would make for an unworkable situation for the shelter.

SECOND READING - An ordinance assessing a 1.0 mill tax on real and personal property as a new millage certifying to the Pulaski County Clerk the new millage and the existing 1.3 millage to be levied by the City of Sherwood on the taxable real and personal property for the tax year 2024. This aims to increase revenue to offset the rising costs of public safety. This millage would be approximately \$34 a year on the average-priced home in Sherwood. **The third reading will be at the September meeting. Please see the article on pages 1-2 of this newsletter.**

PASSED 7 FOR; 1 OPPOSED (COUNCIL PERSON BRODERICK) - An ordinance making the designation of the Sherwood City Finance Department primarily responsible for the reconciliation of the completed citation books for the Sherwood District Court. This ordinance aims to improve efficiency and defines the segregation of duties.

AMENDED/PASSED UNANIMOUSLY AS AMENDED - A resolution approving the acquisition of permanent easements and the purchase of certain tracts of real property in connection with the power line trails. This allows for the purchase of permanent easements and property acquisitions required for the construction of the Powerline Trail if within the spending limits of the Mayor. It was amended to clarify that this is the maximum dollar amount applicable for six properties combined.



- NEVER share your password with anyone, including your best friend. Your parents or guardians are the only people who should know it.



- Never respond to mean or rude texts, messages, and emails. Delete unwanted messages.
- Kids should always tell a parent or trusted adult about any communication or conversation that is scary or hurtful.
- Use the Internet Service Provider's parent-control options to help block access to sites and restrict the transmission of personal information online.
- Discuss the dangers of interacting with strangers online, especially as your children become teenagers. Remind them that people online don't always tell the truth. Have open and honest conversations with your kids.

ROCK REGION METRO MICROTRANSIT LAUNCHING MID-SEPTEMBER

The City of Sherwood is pleased to announce that its first within-city public transit service will officially launch in mid-September through an agreement with Rock Region METRO. This service, known as microtransit or on-demand transit, is a newer addition to the public transit industry.

To help the community prepare for this launch, two public information meetings have been scheduled. These meetings will provide details about the service, including the zone map and how to use the METRO Connect smartphone app.

Microtransit service is a ride-hailing, ride-sharing transportation service that uses smaller, multi-passenger vehicles (such as vans) to transport passengers from any origin point to the destination point within the zone. The service is similar, but different, from private ride-sharing transportation services such as Uber Pool by Uber, which offers riders a cheaper trip fare by combining trips with fellow commuters heading in the same general direction; riders agree to have a more deviated path and more time added to their trip to accommodate such deviations in exchange for the lower fare.



METRO microtransit service will provide shared-ride trips for a low fare of \$2 per person per trip. Unlike private transportation networks, though, METRO microtransit service is limited by geography (trips will only occur within the zone, which is roughly similar to the Sherwood city limits) and time frame (service will operate Monday-Saturday, 6 a.m.-6 p.m.). Riders can use the service for any reason – trips to the grocery store, work, health appointments, coffee meetups, and more. Any member of the public, including residents and visitors, is eligible to ride. The METRO Connect Sherwood microtransit service is a handicapped accessible service.


